

# Spinal cord stimulation feasible for diabetic neuropathy

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(HealthDay)—For patients with painful diabetic peripheral neuropathy (PDPN), spinal cord stimulation (SCS) is a successful treatment, according to a study published online Sept. 11 in *Diabetes Care*.

Rachel Slangen, from the Maastricht University Medical Centre in the Netherlands, and colleagues randomized 36 PDPN patients to SCS in combination with best medical treatment (BMT; 22 patients) and BMT only (14 patients). If trial stimulation was successful, the SCS system was implanted. Definitions of [treatment success](#) include  $\geq 50$  percent pain relief during daytime or nighttime or "(very) much improved" for pain and sleep on the patient global impression of change scale at six months.

The researchers found that 59 percent of the SCS and 7 percent of BMT

met the definition of treatment success (P pain relief were reported by 41 and 36 percent in the SCS group, respectively, and by 0 and 7 percent in the BMT group, respectively (P

"Treatment success was shown in 59 percent of [patients](#) with PDPN who were treated with SCS over a six-month period, although this treatment is not without risks," the authors write.
