

Opioid-related insurance claims rise 3,000 percent

(HealthDay)—The number of private health insurance claims for



Americans addicted to opioids and heroin rose 3,203 percent from 2007 to 2014, according to a Fair Health report.

Fair Health is a nonprofit group concerned with transparency in <u>health</u> <u>care costs</u> and health insurance information.

Since 2011, there were also large increases in the number of claims associated with opioid abuse, heroin overdoses, and drug dependence, *CNBC* reported. In 2014, more than 28,000 people in the U.S. died from opioid overdoses.

Unlike previous opioid epidemics, "the present crisis is disproportionately affecting white, middle-class people in non-urban settings, including those with <u>private health insurance</u>," the Fair Health report stated.
