

## Pharmacist program can improve IFN-beta adherence in MS

(HealthDay)—A pharmacist medication adherence program can improve



adherence to interferon-beta (IFN- $\beta$ ) among patients with relapsingremitting multiple sclerosis (RRMS), according to a letter to the editor published online May 2 in the *Journal of Pharmacy Practice and Research*.

Wing Loong Cheong, M.Pharm., M.B.A., from Monash University in Subang Jaya, Malaysia, describes a pharmacist medication adherence program for patients with RRMS using INF- $\beta$ , established in order to improve <u>patient adherence</u> to treatment and provide education on RRMS and INF- $\beta$ . Patients with RRMS newly prescribed IFN- $\beta$  therapy were enrolled, and received three scheduled monthly appointments with pharmacists, at which, health education was provided. Pharmacists conducted assessments of adherence to IFN- $\beta$ , knowledge, and symptoms and disability experienced at the initial enrollment and during each visit. Twenty-seven patients were enrolled into the 26-month program.

Cheong noted that only one patient was non-adherent. There was an increase in patient knowledge scores, from a mean baseline score of 20.14 to 31.67 (P

"We are encouraged by the high degree of patient adherence to treatment observed in this program and the improvements observed in the <u>patients</u>' knowledge of RRMS and INF- $\beta$ ," Cheong writes. "We look forward to conducting future studies using controlled groups to establish the effect of such a program on patient treatment adherence and to establish the link between patient knowledge and treatment adherence."
