

## Disordered eating associated with higher HbA1c in teens

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(HealthDay)—For youth with type 1 diabetes, disordered eating



behaviors (DEBs) are associated with higher hemoglobin A1c but not with measures of glycemic variability, according to a study published online Jan. 25 in *Diabetes Care*.

Miriam H. Eisenberg Colman, Ph.D., from the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development in Bethesda, Md., and colleagues reported DEB and <u>diabetes</u> management at baseline and at six, 12, and 18 months for youth (ages 8 to 16) with type 1 diabetes participating in an 18-month behavioral intervention.

The researchers found that the intervention had no effect on DEB (P = 0.84). There were correlations for DEB with higher hemoglobin A1c (P = 0.001), mean sensor glucose (P = 0.001), and percent sensor glucose values >180 mg/dL (P = 0.001)

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
