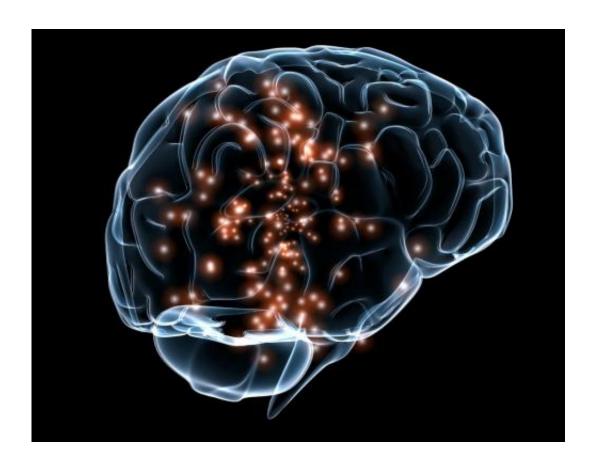


Video: Researchers discover rare genetic brain disorder

An international team of researchers, led by MCRI, have identified a rare genetic brain disorder that causes severe neurological damage in children after a mild episode of fever or illness.



The <u>children</u> died soon after. The research has been published in the January edition of the journal, *Brain*. Only six cases have been found worldwide. Whole-exome or whole-genome sequencing identified recessive NAXD variants in each case. Lead researcher Nicole Van Bergen said that given the underlying genetic basis of the disorder is now understood, <u>future research</u> will investigate whether targeted treatments are possible.
