


Heart-related test results may indicate risk of death in patients with COVID-19

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New research published in the *European Journal of Clinical Investigation* identifies cardiovascular test results that might help to identify patients hospitalized with COVID-19 who face an especially high risk of dying.

Out of 1,401 patients with a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19 admitted to seven Italian centers, 226 (16.1%) underwent transthoracic



echocardiography within 48 hours of admission. In-hospital death occurred in 68 patients (30.1%). Low left ventricular ejection fraction, low tricuspid annular plane systolic excursion, and <u>acute respiratory</u> <u>distress syndrome</u> were independently associated with in-<u>hospital</u> <u>mortality</u>.

"Clinical and echocardiographic parameters of disease severity might help to determine which <u>patients</u> with COVID-19 are at higher risk for in-hospital mortality," said lead author Angelo Silverio, MD, of the University of Salerno, in Italy.
