In July, Australia's Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) provisionally approved the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine for kids aged 12-15.

The Australian Technical Advisory group on Immunization (ATAGI)



<u>subsequently recommended</u> kids in this age group with underlying <u>chronic medical conditions</u>, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and kids living in remote communities should be prioritized.

We're expecting <u>advice</u> from ATAGI as to whether the rollout should be extended to all 12 to 15-year-olds, as countries like <u>the United States</u> and <u>Canada</u> have done.

But where does that leave children under 12? We know they're making up <u>a large proportion</u> of new infections in Australia's current outbreaks, which was not the case last year.
