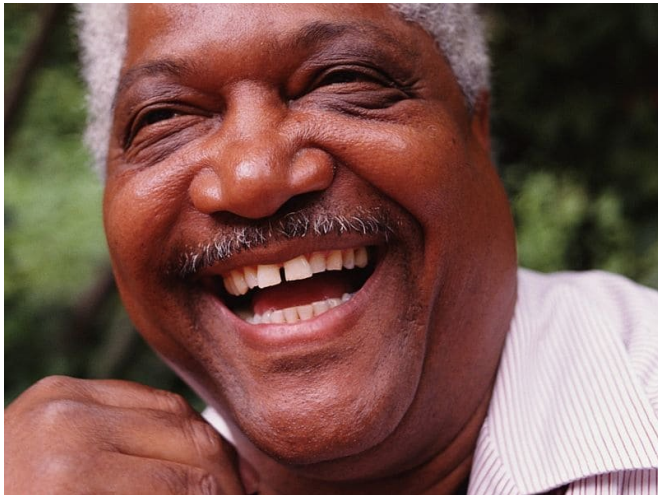


Two strategies for preventing diabetes in minority patients
