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(HealthDay)—The American Academy of Pediatrics, American College of Emergency Physicians, and Emergency Nurses Association have released updated guidelines for emergency care of injured and critically ill children. The guidelines were published in a policy statement in the November issue of *Pediatrics*.

Katherine Remick, M.D., from the Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and colleagues revised a joint [policy statement](#) from 2009 to highlight recent advances in [pediatric emergency care](#).

The authors write that to improve pediatric readiness and the safety and quality of emergency care for children, emergency departments should have a pediatric emergency care coordinator. All emergency departments should be continually prepared to receive, accurately assess, and—at a minimum—stabilize and safely transfer acutely ill or injured children.
